Expanding Global Reach

Bucknell's well-established national brand continues to enhance public awareness of its faculty and staff, who share their research and expertise on a wide range of topics in news media. Over the past year, a dramatic expansion of the University's media footprint brought their discoveries and commentary to an increasingly global audience.

Across News Media

Stories about Bucknell once again appeared in all 50 states in 2023-24, as well as in 56 countries — 25 more than last year, or a 44% increase.* That resulted in 25.8 billion in potential views, a statistic provided by the Meltwater media tracking platform, which estimates the potential viewership based on the number of online visitors. Ad value equivalency of Bucknell mentions rose by \$24 million over last year to reach \$240 million.

Bucknell's earned media in 2023-24 included faculty appearances in nearly 3,000 stories across media channels. Meanwhile, more than 5,000 accounts of our students' academic accomplishments and other collegiate successes were distributed to their hometown news media.

The Presidents Dinner

Bucknell and President John Bravman also continued to lead the national discussion on higher education as hosts of The Presidents Dinner, now in its seventh year. The 2024 event brought together leaders of prestigious colleges and universities and nearly 30 members of the national news media who cover higher education at the National Press Club in Washington, D.C., for an on-the-record conversation.

Inflation and Macroeconomic Trends

Professor **Matías Vernengo**, economics, who is also director of the Bucknell Institute for Public Policy, studies inflation in his native South America as well as in the U.S. The former senior manager of economic research at the Central Bank of Argentina, Vernengo has been a popular news media expert on national and global macroeconomic trends.

Al Jazeera frequently turns to Vernengo as an expert source to discuss Argentina's turbulent economy, and he is regularly quoted in South American media. He published opinion pieces on inflation in *Phenomenal World* and *ProMarket* — two news outlets focused on political economy. He also provided insight on the U.S. economy in a story on ABC News, and an interview on the Harrisburg NPR affiliate, WITF-FM.

Celestial Discoveries

A year ago, Professor **Jackie Villadsen**, physics & astronomy, helped answer the question of whether there are Earth-like planets in far-off solar systems. In the journal *Nature Astronomy*, she and her research team documented findings showing that radio waves from stars such as the red dwarf YZ Ceti, which is 12 light-years away, have magnetic fields similar to that of the Earth. She also authored a *Nature* study documenting the first radiation belt observed outside our solar system.

After her celestial discoveries received national media exposure, they continued to generate worldwide attention through news accounts in Brazil, Chile, China, Germany and Mexico.

Addiction

Professor **Judy Grisel P'16**, psychology, is a behavioral neuroscientist and one of the world's leading experts on addiction. Grisel's work at Bucknell is inspired by her own personal struggle, chronicled in her 2019 New York Times-bestseller *Never Enough: The Neuroscience and Experience of Addiction*. Her research focuses on psychological characteristics of individuals who are likely to develop drug addictions.

She authored addiction-related pieces published last year in *The New York Times, USA Today* and *The Washington Post*. She also contributed her expertise to a *HealthDay* story and a pair of interviews on WWL Radio in New Orleans.



Fireflies

Professor **Sarah Lower**, biology, and her research team explore why some firefly species in North America may be at risk of extinction. Last year, she co-authored a study that analyzed data from the citizen science program Firefly Watch and machine-learning models to find that climate change may pose a greater threat to firefly populations than previously thought.

Her firefly research was highlighted in an interview on the nationally syndicated science program *Science Friday* — her third appearance on the show — and also made headlines in *USA Today* and *Inside Climate News*, among other outlets.

Bats and Disease Ecology

Professors **DeeAnn Reeder P'16** and **Ken Field**, biology, are two of the world's leading researchers on bats and disease ecology. A *National Geographic* cover story this year featured their collaborative research in Uganda focusing on bats' increasing tolerance to Ebola, which was funded by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

Reeder was also part of an international team of biologists, virologists and conservationists that published a paper in *Nature* challenging the prevailing narrative that African bats are the origin of a number of harmful viruses affecting humans.




